NEW LOGO - CUB SCOUT WOGGLES (\$3 EACH)

These new logo Cub Scout woggles are available to every Cub Scout and Cub Leader across Australia. Orders are to be placed by the Cub Scout Leader through your District Cub Leader to the RC Cub Scouts. Get your order in now while stock lasts.



STATE CAMPFIRE BADGE (\$2 EACH)

Cub Packs can earn the State Campfire badge by attending or holding a campfire, usually held in July or August, as a Pack or as a District activity. Orders are to be placed by the Cub Scout Leader through your District Cub Leader to the RC Cub Scouts. Place your orders now.

CUBS CAMP OUT BADGE (\$2 EACH)

The Camp Out badge is a specialist badge developed to prepare Cub Scouts for camping. We encourage Cub Scout Leaders to motivate their Cub Scouts who would like to attend Cuboree to achieve this badge in preparation for the Cuboree. **Please note:** Cuboree WILL count towards the badge, however the Pre-Cuboree shakedown camp does NOT count towards this badge.

The requirements for the **Camp Out Badge** are:

- During a holiday period, pack a bag for the duration of four days and nights. The Cub Scout is to use only that gear over the four days.
- The Cub Scout should wash and dry their own crockery and cutlery during this period
- The Cub Scout is to be aware of the need for good hygiene, storing and packing clothes away neatly in their 'campout bag' and wearing appropriate clothing for activities (wearing enclosed shoes whenever possible.)
- Camp out at home either in the backyard or on the floor in a sleeping bag and learn to use their torch to get to the bathroom etc. in the dark.
- Attend one pack sleep-over.
- Attend a Pack Holiday/Camp and help prepare a meal.
- The Cub Scout is to demonstrate that they are able erect, dismantle and pack up a tent as the member of a team of Cub Scouts.
- The Cub Scout is to discuss with the Cub Scout Leader that he/she is aware of the need for everyone to carry out good hygiene ethics, eat healthy food, drinks lots of water and report any illnesses or injuries, whilst on pack holidays/camps.

Orders for badges are to be placed by the Cub Scout Leader through your District Cub Leader to the RC Cub Scouts. Place your orders now.

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID COURSE



This 14-hour YMHFA Course teaches adults how to provide Mental Health First Aid to adolescents

Mental illnesses often start in adolescence or early adulthood and it is important to detect problems early to ensure the young person is properly treated and supported. The YMHFA course teaches adults who have frequent contact with adolescents, such as parents, guardians, school staff, sport coaches and youth workers, how to assist adolescents who are developing a mental health problem, experiencing a worsening of a mental health problem or in a mental health crisis.

What is the Youth Mental Health First Aid course?

The Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) course is based on international MHFA Guidelines. These Guidelines were developed using consensus of mental health consumers, carers and professionals from English-speaking developed countries.

Course Content

The YMHFA course teaches adults how to assist adolescents who are developing any of the following mental health problems, experiencing a worsening of an existing mental health problem or in a mental health crisis:

Developing mental health problems

- Depression
- Anxiety problems
- Eating disorders
- Psychosis
- Substance use problems.

Mental health crises

- Suicidal thoughts and behaviours
- Non-suicidal self-injury
- Panic attacks
- Traumatic events
- Severe psychotic states
- Severe effects from alcohol or other drug use
- Aggressive behaviours.

Participants will learn about adolescent development and the signs and symptoms of mental health problems, how and where to get help and what sort of help has been shown by research to be effective.

Course Format

This is a 14-hour course. The delivery format is flexible. Course participants receive a copy of the YMHFA Manual to keep and are eligible to become an accredited Mental Health First Aider.

Where can YMHFA courses be held?

The course can be conducted wherever a YMHFA Instructor can travel. If extended travel is required, the instructor's travel expenses may also need to be met (to be negotiated with the instructor). MHFA courses for members of the public are advertised through the MHFA website.

Finding a YMHFA Instructor

You can find MHFA Instructors in your area on the MHFA website and contact them directly about conducting a course for your organisation, workplace or school. Instructors set their own fees, so we recommend you contact several local instructors for quotes. *All instructors of this course are trained by MHFA Australia.*

Who can attend a YMHFA course?

Any interested adult, particularly those who work or live with young people, can attend. We do offer a separate course which teaches adolescents how to provide mental health first aid to their peers, the teen MHFA Course. *See below.*



Become an Accredited Mental Health First Aider

Participants who complete this training are eligible to complete an online Accreditation Assessment in order to receive a Mental Health First Aider Certificate of Accreditation valid for 3 years.

Other MHFA courses for helping young people

teen MHFA for Years 7-9 and Years 10-12

How a young person can assist a peer, in three 75 minute interactive classroom sessions. teen MHFA can only be delivered in schools or clubs where Youth MHFA training has already been rolled out.

SCIENCE PROFICIENCY WORKSHOP

This is the first of three Proficiency badge workshops which will assist the Scouts to achieve each of the three Proficiency badges. At the conclusion of the three workshops, the Scout has the opportunity to do the assessment for the Amateur Radio Foundation License. Successful achievement will entitle the Scout to wear the special Amateur Radio Badge on their uniform.

The Amateur Radio Foundation assessment is a formal qualification issued by the ACMA. Topics covered in this workshop will include; basics of radio waves, how they travel and how the sun (space weather) can affect radio waves. There will be a little bit of theory however we have structured the workshop to include lots of practical experiments. Some of these include constructing antennas, exploring the radio frequency spectrum using different radios and learning the basics of radio direction finding.

This event is a residential weekend starting at 8am Saturday morning 25th May with overnight accommodation in tents provided by the Scouts or their home troop. Meals will be provided from morning tea on Saturday and conclude with lunch on Sunday. The event concludes at 2pm on Sunday 26th May. Cost for the weekend is \$55 for Scouts and \$25 for Leaders, which includes camping and meal costs. This will need to be paid to the GWS Region Office via an invoice sent out upon completion of the registration in EMS.

Payment is required before the event start date.

A number of us spent a very enjoyable day of practical demonstration and honing our Abseil rescue skills. Run by Stuart Cowen, this involved training on hauling and lowering systems, if things do go a bit wrong. It also covers how to get around a knot and even swapping from one rope to another whilst abseiling down a cliff face. Certainly skills we hope we never have to use, but at the same time great skills to havejust in case! And skills you simply cannot learn by looking at a computer screen!

The major Activity event for this month was the **Scout Caving Proficiency Badge** course held down at Wee Jasper, south of Yass. Always a great weekend, with over 50 participants in attendance.

The Scouts were split up into smaller groups, where they were able to explore a number of the horizontal cave systems (with all their twists and turns), and the odd "squeeze" just for fun!

This starts off with a 35m abseil down what can only be described as a big black hole. This is a great cave system with several large chasms and some really interesting formations. I mentioned last month about an opportunity I had to participate in a Scout run 4WD accreditation weekend. 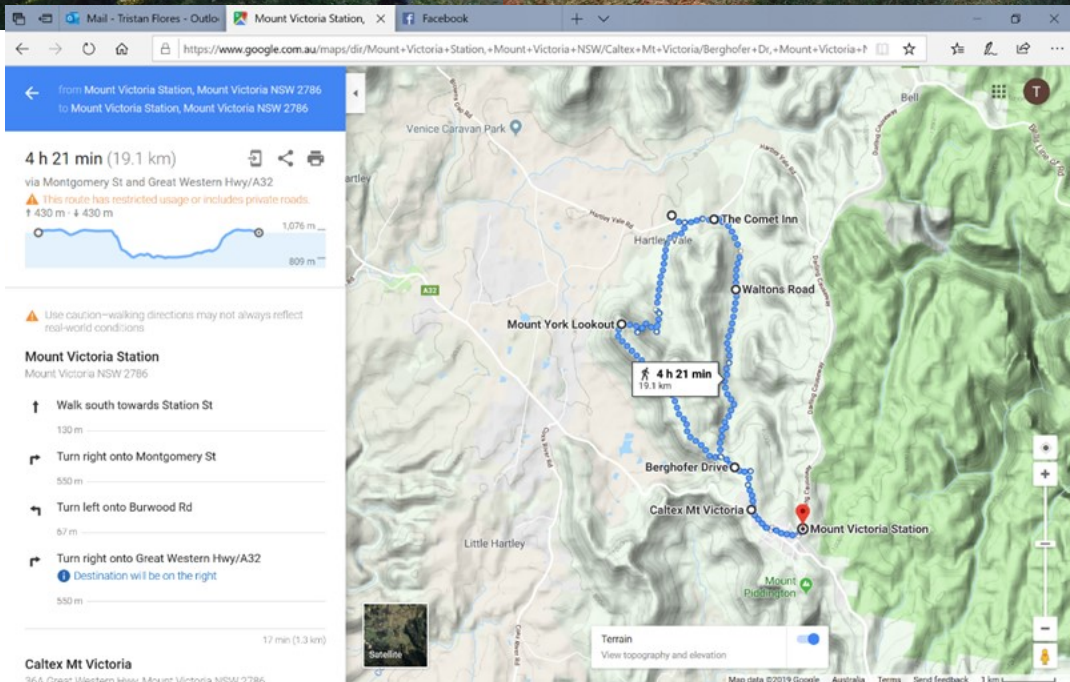
BUSHWALKING REPORT

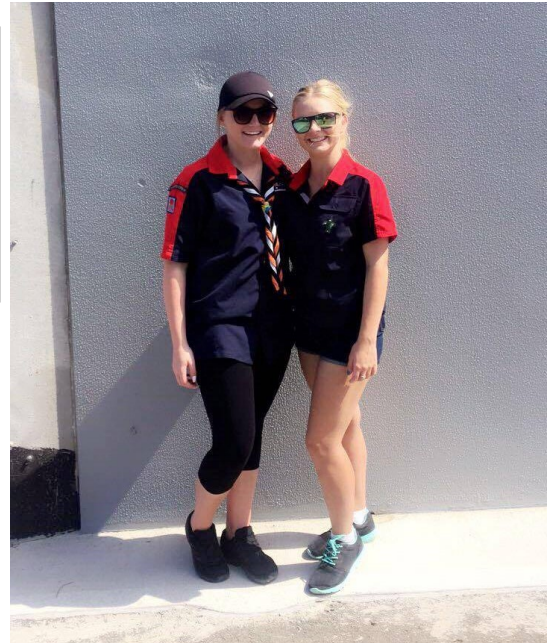

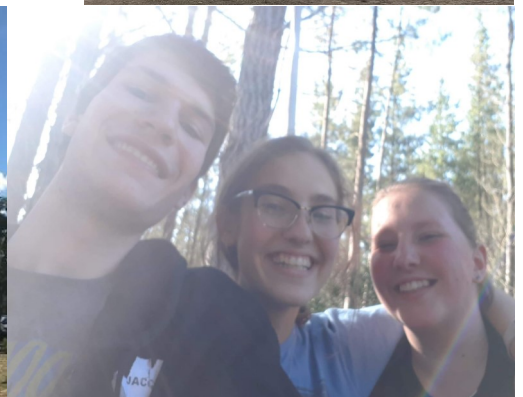

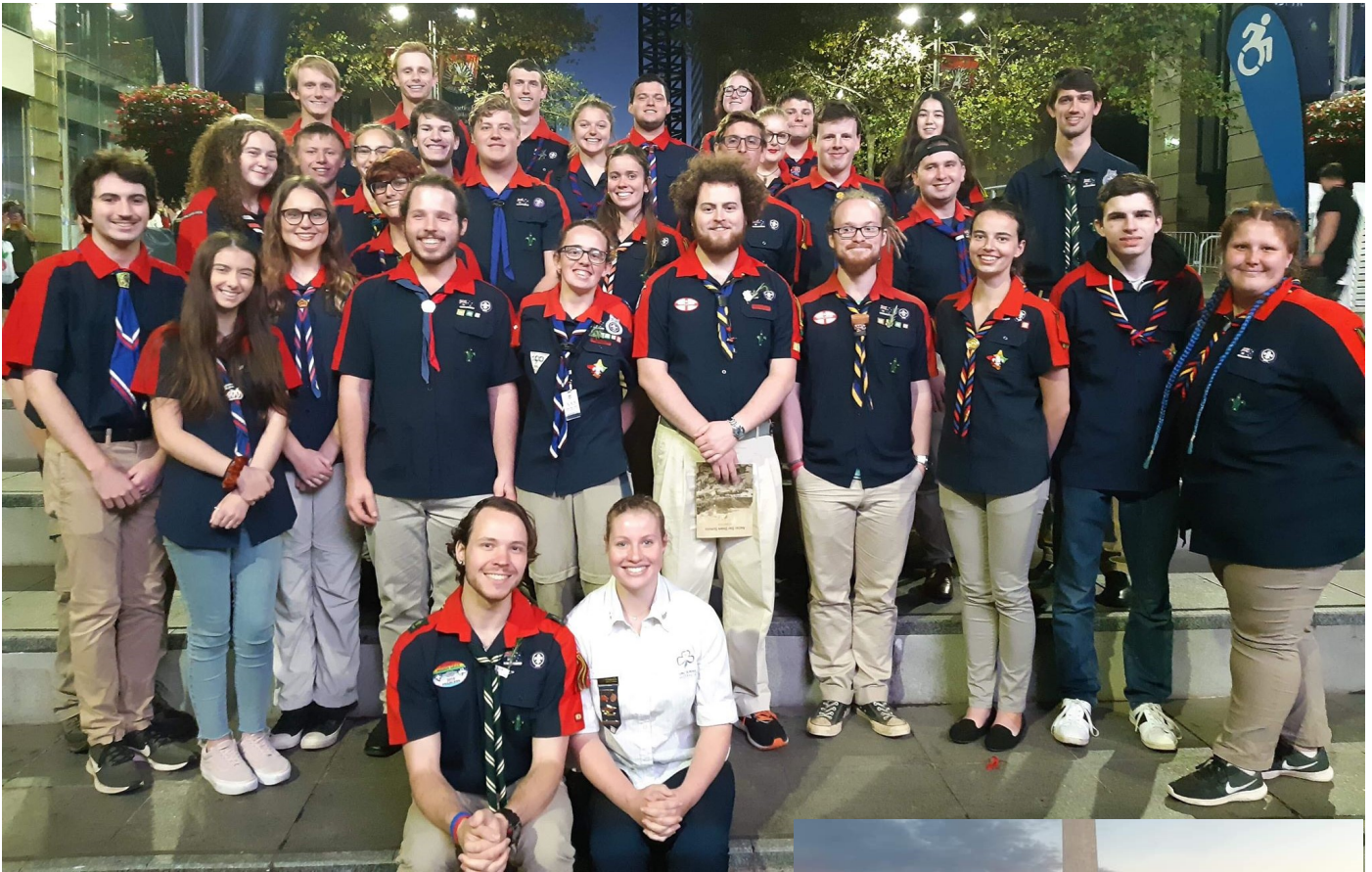
